ABOUT US

Macon Volunteer Clinic began when retired physician **Chapin Henley** gathered a group of diverse volunteers together in fall 2001. They shared a dream to open a free clinic that would provide a medical home for working, uninsured residents of Bibb County. Group leaders visited the Hilton Head Volunteers in Medicine Clinic and other facilities in the Southeast. The research trips confirmed their initial beliefs, that a volunteer clinic was a crucial component in closing some of the healthcare gaps facing the Bibb County community.

A generous grant from McNeil Laboratories and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation funded training from the Volunteers in Medicine Institute. Coliseum Health System donated a rent-free building on Rogers Avenue, and the Community Foundation of

Central Georgia financed the site's renovation. The MedCen Community Health Foundation (now Navicent Health Foundation) supported research, promotion, and fundraising efforts to get the clinic started. The Peyton Anderson Foundation generously funded start-up costs ensuring the clinic's first year of success.

Local businesses and individuals joined the effort and donated numerous items and services to help make the Macon Volunteer Clinic a reality. Volunteers spoke to civic groups and churches, as well as corporations and foundations, further increasing support. As a result of this community-wide effort, Macon Volunteer Clinic was incorporated in 2002, received its 501(c)(3) status the same year, and opened its doors February 2003.

Georgia continues to have one of the highest uninsured rates in the country. Those without insurance often choose to go without healthcare in order to pay for everyday needs.

Macon Volunteer Clinic provides free primary medical and dental care to uninsured working adults in Bibb and Twiggs counties, Georgia, whose income is equal to or less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Level.

Meet Jennifer.

Jennifer has been a patient at Macon Volunteer Clinic for over five years. Before becoming our patient, Jennifer had not sought medical care in a very long time. Jennifer had a life-threatening condition and did not know where to turn for help. Thankfully, a coworker shared eligibility information for being a patient at MVC and suggested she should call. Jennifer was eligible, and with the help of our volunteer providers and the Pharmaceutical Patient Assistance Program, she was able to acquire the medication that helped cure her condition.

Since then, Jennifer has seen many improvements to her overall health through the advice from our clinical volunteers. She has lost weight. Her blood pressure has improved. Her A1C is lower, and her risk for cardiovascular disease is lower. Jennifer

is also walking for exercise and is averaging 5 times a week for 75 minutes.

Jennifer is very grateful for Macon Volunteer Clinic. She says MVC has been a lifesaver. She loves the friendly atmosphere and that our volunteers answer questions promptly or find help to answer her questions. Whenever Jennifer encounters someone in need of medical care, she is now the one sharing about Macon Volunteer Clinic.

Macon Volunteer Clinic celebrates the accomplishments of 2022, all made possible through altruism. With volunteers returning to pre-pandemic levels, we fulfilled 7,601 patient encounters and welcomed 195 new patients! New volunteers joined our journey, representing endocrinology, neurology, acupuncture, dentistry, and more.

Piedmont Macon committed to giving MVC patients \$200,000 in pro bono radiology service a year for the next two years.



Mercer School of Medicine placed an LMFT intern at MVC for the fall semester, giving our patients access to free mental health counseling. The new "Fly Infestation" music fest, in honor of beloved, late J-Fly, who had no health insurance, benefited MVC with a monetary gift and a "friends-raiser."





With the first installment of a 3-year, \$75,000 gift from MetroPower, we began enhancements of a women's health exam room through a new power exam table, a new microscope, and ceiling hung privacy curtains.

Community Impact 2022

The Need — Many of our patients fall into the "coverage gap." They earn too much to qualify for Medicaid and not enough to afford assistance with ACA (Obamacare) premiums. 20% of Bibb County adults are uninsured and 21% of Twiggs County adults are uninsured. Bibb County's 2022 health rankings are near the bottom of 159 counties in Georgia.

Q: Isn't everyone covered by health insurance under the Affordable Care Act?

No, not at all. Many people in Georgia remain uninsured even after the passage of the Affordable Care Act.

The uninsured include:

- Adults who make too much money to qualify for Medicaid but not enough to afford the federal insurance exchanges.
- Adults who are not required to purchase insurance due to very low incomes or other hardship categories such as domestic violence or foreclosure.
- Adults who are eligible for insurance on the federal exchange but who cannot afford the high co-pays and deductibles associated with even the most modest insurance plan available under the ACA.

Q: Where do MVC patients come from?

Macon Volunteer Clinic (MVC) patients are working, low-income adults who are not offered insurance by their employers, and who cannot afford to purchase health insurance on their own. Many of our patients are service industry employees who work at restaurants, dry cleaners, daycares, and hotels. They sit with elderly people, clean houses, and take care of children. They are the faces of the working uninsured in Bibb and Twiggs counties. Without the services of the Clinic, MVC patients report they would use the local emergency room or would use urgent care.

Q: How does MVC impact the local community?

By providing quality healthcare to working, uninsured adults, Macon Volunteer Clinic contributes to the health and prosperity of our entire community. MVC provides primary medical, dental, and eye care, as well as

medication assistance to adults with multiple and complex medical problems who would otherwise end up in the emergency room due to lack of insurance. This reduces the amount of uncompensated care provided by local hospitals and helps MVC patients avoid additional health complications.

The care provided at MVC helps lower the cost of healthcare for ALL residents of Bibb and Twiggs counties. In fact, a University of Georgia study found that \$50,000 in emergency room costs is saved each year for every 100 patients treated by a charitable clinic in Georgia.

Q: Why is it so important to treat uninsured adults in Bibb and Twiggs counties?

Healthcare costs and loss of productivity associated with lack of health insurance are staggering. The uninsured are much less likely to have primary care providers than the insured. They also receive less preventive care, dental care, chronic disease management, and behavioral health counseling. Those without insurance are often diagnosed at later, less treatable disease stages than those with insurance. Overall, people with no insurance have worse health outcomes, lower quality of life, and higher mortality rates. MVC patients benefit from a regular source of healthcare and medication assistance, as do the families who rely on their income and the employers who rely on their presence.

Q: Who provides MVC medical care?

MVC has over 130 volunteer physicians, nurses, dentists, dental hygienists, and other providers who generously donate their time to help care for patients in need. MVC medical care is overseen by an experienced board-certified physician who serves as Medical Director.

A new local music fest titled 'The Fly Infestation' debuted in October 2022, and its organizers chose Macon Volunteer Clinic as its beneficiary. Why? J-Fly, the individual it honored, is the face of Macon Volunteer Clinic.

Another year has passed, and the Macon Volunteer Clinic continues to move forward. Serving the uninsured workers in Bibb County, and now Twiggs County, remains our top priority.

The Macon Volunteer Clinic has had a long relationship with the Macon Rescue Mission, providing care for their residents. In 2022, we took the clinic to them. We now have onsite service at the Rescue Mission. This onsite clinic sees patients twice monthly.

We made great strides in 2022 with Women's Health. Through a generous grant from Metro Power, we have been able to purchase new equipment and provide more privacy for our female patients. Another grant continues to enable our patients to receive mammograms to screen for breast cancer.

The Clinic is constantly looking for ways to better serve our patients. We were able to do so in the past year by adding several new providers in different specialties that the Clinic sorely needed. We now have volunteer providers in endocriniology, neurology, acupuncture, and counseling. We have also partnered with outside providers for gastroenterology and physical therapy services.





Mackenzie was suffering with depression. This caused her to


