The other news we were waiting for also came out from Le Bocage International School this week. They have approval for new admissions policies involving Clavis and our Year 6 students. 
Finally, this is to say thank you to the PTA for a wonderfully presented and informative AGM on Wednesday. Congratulations on a successful year!

### MORE UPDATES ON ADMISSIONS TO LE BOCAGE

We are happy to finally be able to confirm that the policy proposal that was discussed in the previous Chronicle has been approved by the LBIS Board. LBIS will move forward with a system that sets aside 72 seats for Clavis students each year, essentially giving every Year 6 student an opportunity to join LBIS if they want and meet the admission requirements.

This was only agreed to this week and a final policy agreement is now being written up, along with more details on minimum criteria and expectations that students must meet. This criteria is not planned to deviate from what has been in place previously but Clavis will be working closer with LBIS on how we can prepare students (as early as Year 4) who may not be able to be successful meeting the criteria at LBIS.



Mr David Jenkins, the Head of School at LBIS, has suggested he would do a Zoom session with parents who would like to know more; however, we will wait for the final policy wording to be completed and shared out first. This way, the presentation will serve to help clarify and answer any questions surrounding the new policy.

### CHANGES TO YEAR LEVEL ATTENDANCE DAYS

This week the Ministry of Education announced changes coming to the school year and staggered days. Government schools will continue their year until the end of April with Term 2 going from 13 September to 17 December and Term 3 going from 10 January to 29 April. While this has no impact on our school year, the eventual removal of staggered days is an exciting change that does affect Clavis. Starting 18 October, all students and year levels will be able to return to school five-days-a-week. We eagerly hope that no issues arise that postpone this date and we will be even happier if authorities decide to move it earlier. Below is the schedule we will follow until the planned return of everyone on 18 October.



### **ACTION IN THE PYP IN YEAR 1**

A ction falls under the IB PYP standard: Approaches to teaching, Practice 1, "Teachers use inquiry, action and reflection to develop natural curiosity in students."



Action is part of the learning process that invites the child's initiation to inquire about things and finding the answers to their questions. The action invitation encourages the child



to be responsible and confident about their own learning. It also makes the students reflect on their learning.

After inquiring about different types of molluscs in class

through videos and books, a Korean student created a poster at home. He illustrated different molluscs using attractive colours and labelled each drawing in English and Korean. During the "Show and Tell" activity, he had the opportunity to share his project with his friends in English. The other members of the class were excited to learn some Korean words related to the unit that we are inquir-

ing about.





Children shared their understanding about the differences between vertebrates, invertebrates and the different types of molluscs they have seen.

In class children observed the bugs, discussed and shared the wonderings and findings with their teachers and classmates. They even went further and were able to classify the different groups of molluscs such as "gastropods, cephalopods and bivalves". At home some of them drew and wrote about the molluscs and then brought it to share with the rest of the class.

### STUDENT-ONLY SPORTS DAY 2021

Infortunately, changes to the staggered day calendar are not scheduled to come into effect until 18 October and, even then, we do not know what will be recommended regarding additional people on campus. Because of this, we must still continue with the Sports Days dates announced previously on staggered days. However, it is still not recommended



to allow large groups on campus from outside the school. As a result, unfortunately, we will not be able to have parents on campus during Sports Days this year. We are looking at ways to ensure parents do not miss out on their children's excitement and participation of the day, but this will likely be through video and pictures that we are working to arrange for each year level.

### SUPPORTING ENGLISH LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

**B** eing proficient in effective communication is essential for everyone. English is our language of instruction at Clavis but it is not the first language spoken by much of our community. It is also a very difficult language to master, even for those who speak it as their mother tongue.

Because of the importance we place in language acquisition and fluency, we would like to update everyone about a collaboration we are looking at forming with an organization called Success English. The purpose of pursuing this is to look at opportunities where we can improve our strategies for teaching English to students who are new to it but also provide resources for our community, including staff and parents. We can help to improve our students English acquisition by building up the English they are surrounded by and exposed to.

In addition to where we can advance our resources and strategies at school, Success English will also offer additional courses outside of school. They have places in St Pierre and Cascavelle that offer courses designed to help kids (ages of 5 to 18) with their English skills, as well as boost their confidence as young communicators. They explained that they use fun, interactive and communicative methods to keep the kids engaged, and all of their teachers are highly expe-




rienced and wellqualified. They follow a Cambridge English syllabus woven into a range of fun activities which include use of drama, art, music and play. They also provide an online elearning platform so students can continue to practice, play, and extend their English learning at home. Their classes run all day on Saturdays and after school on weekdays. They are offering a 10% discount to all Clavis students who register for one or more of their EAL programmes.

When Covid requirements are lifted and we can offer After-School Activities again, Clavis will be working with them to provide different levels of support for students with courses at school; however, we will also like to be able to offer options for anyone in our parent community as well. We will explore what the interests and logistics of this would be before knowing if it is viable.

### PYP EVALUATION FEEDBACK AND TAKING ACTION

We recently received the final (official) report from the IB head office. As a staff, we began dissecting it to review the IB's commendations, look at general observations, and understand the recommendations. These recommendations need to be put into an action plan that will form part of the school Strategic Plan over the coming years (more on that in the future). Overall, the IB did not identify any matters to be addressed, but the recommendations provide feedback for areas that can be improved. These are as follows, copied directly from the report:



- The school may wish to review its approach to addressing the needs of mother tongue languages within the school community in addition to the host country language.
- 2. The school may wish to adhere to their two year review cycle for policies and review all policies to ensure they reflect the requirements of the PYP including the enhancements in addition to reflect the practices happening in the school.
- 3. The school may wish to collaboratively review the language policy to ensure it is up to date with programme requirements and reflect the practices happening in the school.
- 4. The school may wish to collaboratively continue revising the assessment policy to ensure it includes the programme requirements and the assessment practices in the school and share this policy with the greater community.
- 5. The school may wish to establish a process to share the curriculum and programme of inquiry with the school community.
- 6. The school may wish to revisit the timelines and accountabilities for reviewing the programme of inquiry regularly and systematically.
- 7. The school may wish to collaborate and develop a shared understanding of inquiry and the different types of inquiry while reviewing the school's inquiry cycle and ensure that all teachers across the curriculum are using an inquiry approach to learning and teaching.

8. The school may wish to review their understanding of action and develop systems and process to acknowledge, celebrate and document student action.

Overall, as a school, there is a lot to be excited about and feel proud of. In almost 115 areas where we got feedback, there were only eight which they identified as areas to review or consider changes. We are in agreement with the IB on these and were already aware of some of these areas to be considered; however, we might be a little more critical of ourselves than the IB and we have identified other areas to focus on as well.

As we work on our action plan for these items, we will also be incorporating many other areas into our goals and strategic plan. These come from self-identified concerns, staff and student feedback, and input from our parent community which has been repeated on surveys and communications from across year levels.

We will be working on a Clavis Strategic Plan over Term 3 and hope to present a final version in January of 2022. This document should provide a vision and guidance to where and how we want to see Clavis evolve in the short term, in five years, and even ten years from now!
