WHAT DO YOU NEED TO KNOW THAT IS HAPPENING AT CLAVIS?





Report cards will be available on Friday 18 Novem-

ber. Unless there are any technical issues, reports will be ready to download from ManageBac later that afternoon. Reports measure where the students' understanding and skill levels are in concepts and standards at this time of the year. That measure is a result of a combination of data points from formative observations, day-today work, conversations and discussions, and summative or benchmark assessments. If you have any questions about your child's report or discover any errors, please inform us immediately so they can be resolved.



Friday, 18 November is a civvies / non-uniform day for students if they choose. There will not be any donations or a cost required for students not in uniform; however, clothing must respectful, safe, and appropriate for school. It should not create any distractions for the wearer or others around them.



In preparation for January 2023, please take note of the parent orientation and welcome sessions that will take place on Wednesday 11 January in your child's classroom (instead of the staffroom as in previous years). More information will be coming out about the start of next year as well as the teachers. The session will be about 40 minutes long. If you cannot attend, rest assured that the presentation and information will be sent to you. We will not be able to live stream them. This session is only for parents

(no returning students should be there); however, new students to Clavis are invited to attend, as they will also have their school orientation at this time.

SOME CHANGES COMING IN 2023

A s always, we will continue to look for ways to move Clavis forward and ways that will improve learning for all of our students. There were many new initiatives that started this year which we will further consolidate and use more effectively in the future. We are looking at improving and changing in a number of areas next year. Some include:

1. French will be done with a rotation of six teachers in each year level instead of five, and differentiated learning groups will be extended into Year 1. Our French team has been hard at work over the past years approaching learning in new ways. Two years ago we shifted away from one teacher per year level to have multiple teachers supporting multiple levels of learning. Their new framework should allow for more personalised learning and a greater involvement in Year 1, where we introduced French instruction last year.



- 2. The use of increased use of technology has always been something that is of interest to many; however, technology without purpose can be simply a waste of time. The use of technology and teaching of technology skills should go hand-in-hand with subject learning and should be used to enhance and support that learning. A few more iPads will be added to the school to provide more options and availabilities for students. Additionally, TV screens will be added in every learning space as a teaching resource and allow alternative ways to explore concepts and information.
- 3. Performing Arts (Music) will come together with Visual Arts (Art) under the wider umbrella of The Arts. We are exploring new ways to see the arts within classrooms and how we can consider more creative and innovative forms of both. Ultimately, we would also like to see where the Dramatic Arts (Drama) can fit into our programme of learning more in the future.
- 4. Parents have long asked to make online platforms simpler to engage with and understand. At the moment, the Seesaw Family App is used by parents to see their child's portfolio and message teachers, the Seesaw Class App is used by students for learning activities and to engage with their portfolios, and ManageBac is used by parents to update their information and access report cards. This is also the platform that teachers use for their unit planning. Next year, both Seesaw and ManageBac will be migrated into a single platform called <u>Toddle</u>. We are very excited about the benefits it will have for parents, students, and teachers as it also provides more usability and resources for teaching and learning (like attendance, which will appear on reports next year). We will be sending out more information in January along with how to use all aspects of it (don't worry, we will make it as simple and painless as possible!).
- 5. There will be a new role for a Language Arts Coordinator beginning next year. Our Year 3 teacher, Ms Sajeela Gowrisunkur, has also been leading our Language Arts Committee work over the past two years helping to guide our curriculum scope and sequence, data collection and analysis, assessment and tracking, and resourcing. We still have much to accomplish and so we have created this position for next year. While continuing with the above, Ms Sajeela will also be working with teachers in their classrooms, supporting and coaching reading and writing learning and planning.

Besides the above, we are continuously finding ways to better meet the learning needs of our students. Throughout next year, we will continue to keep you updated with new resources, learning engagements, and ways of working that contribute to our continued school improvement efforts. Thank you for your ongoing support and trust in all we do.

SUMMER LEARNING AND ENGAGEMENT OPTIONS

We know from the research and our own experience the negative effects of long holidays on children when they are not staying mentally active. Over the summer break, many students will have dropped a few levels in their reading and regressed by a month or more in their maths, as examples. Many academics refer to this as the *summer slide*. The good news is that very little is needed to maintain our students' academic levels throughout the holidays and we would like to suggest some ideas and options to help.



For our students who had access this year, they will continue to have access to IXL and RAZ-Kids over the summer. Reading for a short time every day should be the minimum our students can and should be doing; however, getting into a routine where students work on critical thinking skills and problem-solving as well, is amazing for summer cognitive development. Regular work with IXL in Language Arts and Maths will not only maintain their levels but will likely improve them also. However, there are many other options and opportunities available to you. Please read on!

A quick Internet search will give you thousands of pages of ideas and resources for things your child can do and ways to keep your children mentally active and still learning over the summer, inside and outside the home. Among these suggestions are some important things to keep in mind:

- 1. **Rest is important.** It is great to have fun-filled days but bedtimes often become later and later as the holidays progress. Getting enough sleep and rest is needed for mental and physical development, while keeping up with routines will make it much easier transitioning back to school in January
- 2. **Healthy body, healthy mind.** You have heard this many times before but it is very true. Though the heat might encourage people to slow down a bit, we do not want our students to stop moving and keeping fit. Remember, exercise is a celebration of what we can do, not a punishment for something we ate.
- 3. **Explore someplace new.** Trips to new places promote curiosity and asking questions. Getting out into nature, visiting a museum, or going to a historic site will generate learning connected to language, maths, art, science, history, geography and any number of areas. You never know when teachable moments might occur!
- 4. **Technology can be used for good**. Aside from the applications we use, you can discover amazing websites and apps that engage thinking and promote learning most of them free! Here is a great place to start: <u>10 Great Free Websites for Elementary School</u> <u>Common Sense Education</u>
- 5. **Read, read, and read.** Often the most accessible and easiest thing students can do is also the best and most impactful thing for their learning and development. Three things that we want you to keep in mind are: a) find texts that children can be successful in, b) find texts that children are interested in, and c) find uninterrupted time to allow children to dive into a book.
- 6. Write all about it. Keeping a journal or daily diary is a wonderful way of reflecting on their days and work on their organisation, vocabulary, and creativity skills. It's also something students can share with their new teacher next year and be proud of!

There are lots of things that you can do for your children to support them staying mentally and physically active, but do not forget the **importance of allowing children to be bored**. This promotes selfmanagement, creativity, and problem-solving skills. It also allows students an opportunity to be reflective and be mindful, encouraging children to daydream and stimulate their brains in many different ways.
