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Concerns over anti-social driving

Unfortunately, we have not received many reports via our 101/999 or online forms. We encourage people to make sure if you are being affected by problems with anti-social drivers to report this, only by doing this can we understand the extent of issues being faced by residents in our area.

To combat the problem we are gathering information on the drivers so they can be held accountable for their actions. We have made all teams aware of the issues so patrols can be increased especially during the evening and night time.

LOCAL PRIORITIES

Anti-Social Driving

We are receiving reports of boy racers at various locations in the Minehead area.

Action: Regular speed checks will be conducted in the area with an aim to reduce speeding vehicles, section 59's will be issued for anti-social driving styles.

Drugs

To target and hold responsible those using and supplying drugs in the area.

Action: To continue working to gain further information on those responsible for drugs in the Minehead area whilst targeting and holding accountable those we find to be involved.

ASB in recreation and town centre areas

Focusing on ASB in our parks and recreation areas plus focus on town centre.

Action: Patrols have been increased especially during the peak times at which we have been told the problems are occurring.

Shop Thefts

There are several reports regarding shop thefts at shops in Minehead. These may continue to increase due to cost of living.

Action: We are working with any stores where possible and have carried out some proactive work to ensure that suspects have been held accountable for their actions,

Courier Fraud

The City of London Police have run a campaign this month warning the public about courier fraud.

How common is Courier Fraud?

The older generation are a particular target for this type of fraud, with victims over 70 losing £12.6 million last year across the country. Here in Avon and Somerset, we had 60 victims of courier fraud in 2022 with a total loss of £278,000. It's even more shocking when you consider that only about 20% of fraud is actually reported.

What is Courier Fraud?

Courier fraud involves the victim receiving a call from a fraudster pretending to be from their bank or the police. More commonly, they purport to be a high-ranking police officer, usually from L ondon. They will claim that they need your help with an investigation. This is a long process where a range of lies are told in order to convince the victim that this is a legitimate investigation, and often lasts a whole day or takes place over a couple of days. They will often claim that they have someone in custody claiming to be your relative. When you say that you don't have a relative of that name, they will say that they are using a false identity and have a cloned bank card of yours. They then say that there is fraud occurring within the victim's bank.



The victim will eventually be asked to attend their bank and withdraw a sum of money, or instead, purchase high value goods such as jewellery or gold. To make the fraud more plausible, they will often ask the victim to read out the serial numbers on the back of the notes. The fraudster will proceed to tell them that a large percentage of the notes are counterfeit and therefore must be collected by a "courier" as evidence. They will usually provide the victim with a pre-agreed password for pick up and may even give them a receipt so that the money can be reimbursed. The fraudster may instead ask that they hand over their bank card(s) and PIN.

Remember...

- The bank or police will NEVER ask you to withdraw cash, purchase high value goods or hand over your bank cards and PIN to assist with an investigation.
- HANG UP! the genuine police or bank would never be annoyed by you being cautious of a call, only a fraudster.
- Fraudsters can disguise their numbers to appear to be calling from anywhere they want, including your bank. They can also hold the line open, so ensure you either do your checks on a different phone or wait at least 10 minutes for the line to clear. If you can, attend your bank or police station in person.
- Take 5 and Tell 2 Take 5 minutes away from the contact and think carefully about what is beiong asked of you. Then, tell 2 people about the contact you have had to get their opinion.

Somerset students speak out about violence against woman and girls

Over the last few months students across Somerset have been studying the topic of violence against women and girls, and have demonstrated their fantastic knowledge and amazing creativity by writing and producing podcasts on the subject.


The podcasts were then uploaded onto the website for the general public to vote for their favourite. In total, 20,467 votes were cast, meaning the VAWG message has been spread far and wide. Since January 2023 Collaborate Digital as part of the Safer Somerset Partnership have achieved the following:

- 32 Schools and Colleges visited
- 28 Creative Media Workshops delivered
- 66 Interactive Assemblies presented
- 139 Podcasts produced
- 9,925 Students engaged







Supporting children at risk of exclusion

Teachable moments is an intervention strategy within schools .They deliver interventions to secondary school students who are at risk of weapon possession, violence, or exploitation this can be in the form of 1:1 work, group work or workshops.

Knife Crime Workshops

One of our workers have ran Year 8 Knife Crime workshops at Holyrood Academy as a response due to an incident that recently took place there involving a student carrying a knife. This was also linked in with it being Knife Crime The course includes; cleaning and lubrication of bikes, making small adjustments to adapt bikes for a perfect fit and wider maintenance and cycling issues. The scheme is designed to be progressive through each week, offering an insight into bikes and the trade, and ensuring that students cover all aspects Awareness week.

PRU interventions

Teachable moments are also currently undertaking 1:1 'Positive masculinity' interventions with three pupils at a local PRU, discussing misogyny and gender equality.

Bike Project

It offers students one session a week, for around 6-8 weeks, to build up bike maintenance skills step-by-step, developing the skills needed to keep a bike road-worthy and safe. of fundamental maintenance principles, as well as discussing any other issues they may be facing in day to day life alongside.



Knife Crime Awareness Week & Op Sceptre

The VRU team have been out in Somerset communities from 15th -19th May operating engagement stands in schools and at Glastonbury market to support Avon and Somerset police with a week of action to prevent knife crime.

They have had the opportunity to meet the general public, school/college staff and students.



As part of the national campaign we have also managed to install a knife bin outside Deane House (Taunton), where people can voluntarily hand any knifes/weapons into the bin whilst remaining completely anomalous.
