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TRINITY TIDBITS

October was originally the eighth month of the Roman calendar. It comes from the Latin word "octo" meaning eight. Later, it became the 10th month when January and February were added to the Calendar. The Saxons called the month Wintirfyllith because it had the first full moon of the winter season.

Listed are a few historic events that took place in October:

- October 1, 1948 Reverend John W. Schauer Jr. was called to be pastor of Trinity Evangelical Church.
- October 1, 1950 Reverend John W. Schauer left Trinity Evangelical Church when he was called to active military service.
- October 9, 1960 A part time secretary for Trinity Church was discussed and left up to the Ladies Aid Society.
- October 12 1934 President Franklin Delano Roosevelt designated Columbus Day a national holiday.

 The Biden administration issued a proclamation recognizing Indigenous Peoples Day in 2021. The commemoration of Native American history and culture is now federally recognized alongside Columbus Day which has been historically observed on the same Day.
- October 13, 1775 The United States navy was born after the Second Continental Congress authorized the acquisition of a fleet of ships.
- October 13, 1792 The cornerstone of the White House was laid by George Washington.
- October 13, 2024 is Pastor Appreciation Day. Acknowledge Pastor Karen for the time and dedication she has show to all the congregation at Trinity Church.
- October 24 An annual commemorative day, reflecting the official creation of the United Nations on October 24, 1945.
- October 31, All Hallows Eve The tradition originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts.
- October 31, 1517 Martin Luther posted on a church door in Wittenberg, Germany, his Ninety-Five Theses, a manifesto that turned a protest about an indulgence scandal into the Protestant Reformation.
- October 31, 1913 The 1st US paved coast to coast highway, the Lincoln Highway is dedicated. This is known as Route 30 between Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and Granger, Wyoming.
- October 31, 1941 Mount Rushmore Monument is completed in South Dakota, designed by Gutzon Borglum.
- October 31, 2011 According to the United Nations Population Fund, on this day the world's population reached seven billion people.

Protestant Reformation

This month we will be celebrating Reformation Day and showing the movie Martin Luther. The following briefly describes what lead up to the Protestant Reformation in 1517.

The efforts of the Apostle Paul and other early missionaries established local congregations in many parts of the Roman Empire. Each of these local churches was a part of the Body of Christ and represented the whole body in the community which it served. With the churches so scattered however, the problem of organization and unity quickly became important. The power and authority of Bishops grew as the need for unity became stronger. The Church grew in numbers and strength throughout the Roman Empire, despite periodic persecutions. In the year 1313, the emperor Constantine believed that the Christian God had helped him win an important military victory resulting in Christianity becoming the official religion of the Empire and the emperor himself became a convert. Political power became a temptation and a problem for the church. Because Rome was the most important city and because it was in Rome that both Peter and Paul had reputedly been martyred and because the Church in Rome had been of most importance from the earliest days, the Bishop of Rome gradually looked to settle disputed matters. When the capital of The Roman Empire was moved from Rome to Byzantine, the Bishop of Rome was left as the most powerful person in the city. From this situation grew the Papacy with all its religious and political authority.

Throughout the Middle Ages, the Papacy grew in power. With the accumulation of power came the corruption within the Church of Jesus Christ and a tendency on the part of the Papacy to claim ultimate authority for itself. It was against this authority and partially corrupt institution that the Protestant reformers "protested". To them, no human institution, not even the Church, could claim divine authority

for itself and such a claim was even more unacceptable in view of the corruption that had settled in the Roman office.

In October 1517, a noisy procession marched through the towns and cities of Germany. A representative of the pope, named Johann Tetzel, was in this procession and carried with him a message from the pope promising to pardon the sins of people both living and dead. This pardon could be secured by buying a letter of indulgence, which was like buying goodness to offset ones wrongdoing. The money paid went toward the construction of St. Peter's Church in Rome, Italy.

Shortly after this display, on October 31st, a German monk and professor of moral theology at the university of Wittenberg, Germany named Martin Luther, protested this message from the pope of the Catholic Church and on the door of the Wittenberg, Germany church he posted a notice containing 95 reasons why Tetzel's sale of indulgences and other church practices was wrong and should be stopped. The movement spread throughout Europe, influenced by key reformers like John Calvin, a French theologian and Ulrich Zwingli, a key leader of the reformation in Switzerland. This movement was aided by the printing press, which helped disseminate these new ideas throughout the land. Luther was seeking a chance to debate the question of indulgences with those who believed in them, but instead, this act started off the Protestant Reformation, leading to the establishment of Protestant denominations, religious wars and the eventual developments of the separation of church and state in places like the United States. The movement emphasized the importance of personal faith over papal authority, promoted the use of vernacular Bibles and challenged the Catholic Church's practices regarding indulgences and salvation, ultimately creating fragmented Protestant denominations that included Lutherans, Calvinists and Anglicans.
