ABOUT US

Macon Volunteer Clinic began when retired physician **Chapin Henley** gathered a group of diverse volunteers together in fall 2001. They shared a dream to open a free clinic that would provide a medical home for working, uninsured residents of Bibb County. Group leaders visited the Hilton Head Volunteers in Medicine Clinic and other facilities in the Southeast. The research trips confirmed their initial beliefs, that a volunteer clinic was a crucial component in closing some of the healthcare gaps facing the Bibb County community.

A generous grant from McNeil Laboratories and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation funded training from the Volunteers in Medicine Institute. Coliseum Health System donated a rent-free building on Rogers Avenue, and the Community Foundation of Central Georgia financed the site's renovation. The MedCen Community Health Foundation (now Navicent Health Foundation) supported research, promotion, and fundraising efforts to get the clinic started. The Peyton Anderson Foundation generously funded start-up costs ensuring the clinic's first year of success.

Local businesses and individuals joined the effort and donated numerous items and services to help make the Macon Volunteer Clinic a reality. Volunteers spoke to civic groups and churches, as well as corporations and foundations, further increasing support. As a result of this community-wide effort, Macon Volunteer Clinic was incorporated in 2002, received its 501(c)(3) status the same year, and opened its doors February 2003.

Vaccinations provided confidence to new and returning volunteers to serve our patients at Macon Volunteer Clinic. In fact, we enjoyed a total of 1,613 more volunteer hours contributed in our Clinic in 2021, than in 2020!

In partnership with the UGA SNAP-Ed program, our patients now have access to Food eTalk, an evidence-based, online nutrition education program. These modules are made purpose of fostering a community where all working adults, regardless of insurance or ability to pay, can lead healthy and productive lives.

Most importantly, MVC continued to welcome through its doors hundreds of hard working Macon-Bibb County neighbors who would otherwise "fall through the cracks" of our healthcare system. FAQs

Q: Isn't everyone covered by health insurance now under the Affordable Care Act?

No, not at all. Many people in Georgia and Macon-Bibb County remain uninsured even after the passage of the Affordable Care Act.

The uninsured include:

- Adults who make too much money to qualify for Medicaid but not enough to afford the federal insurance exchanges.
- Adults who are not required to purchase insurance due to very low incomes or other hardship categories such as domestic violence or foreclosure.
- Adults who are eligible for insurance on the federal exchange but who cannot afford the high co-pays and deductibles associated with even the most modest insurance plan available under the ACA.

Q: Where do MVC patients come from?

Macon Volunteer Clinic (MVC) patients are working, low-income adults who are not offered insurance by their employers, and who cannot afford to purchase health insurance on their own. Many of our patients are service industry employees who work at restaurants, dry cleaners, daycares, and hotels. They sit with elderly individuals, clean houses, and take care of children. They are the faces of the working uninsured in Bibb County. Without the services of the Clinic, MVC patients report they would use the local emergency room or would use urgent care.

Q: How does MVC impact the local community?

By providing quality healthcare to working, uninsured adults, Macon Volunteer Clinic contributes to the health and prosperity of our entire community. MVC provides primary medical, dental, and eye care, as well as medication assistance to adults with multiple and complex medical problems who would otherwise end up in the emergency room due to lack of insurance. This reduces the amount of uncompensated care provided by local hospitals and helps MVC patients avoid additional health complications.

The care provided at MVC helps lower the cost of healthcare for ALL residents of Macon-Bibb County. In fact, a University of Georgia study found that \$50,000 in emergency room costs is saved each year for every 100 patients treated by a charitable clinic in Georgia.

Q: Why is it so important to treat uninsured adults in Macon-Bibb County?

Healthcare costs and loss of productivity associated with lack of health insurance are staggering. The uninsured are much less likely to have primary care providers than the insured. They also receive less preventive care, dental care, chronic disease management, and behavioral health counseling. Those without insurance are often diagnosed at later, less treatable disease stages than those with insurance. Overall, people with no insurance have worse health outcomes, lower quality of life, and higher mortality rates. MVC patients benefit from a regular source of healthcare and medication assistance, as do the families who rely on their income and the employers who rely on their presence.

Q: Who provides MVC medical care?

MVC has over 150 volunteer physicians, nurses, dentists, dental hygienists, and other providers who generously donate their time to help care for patients in need. MVC medical care is overseen by an experienced board-certified physician who serves as Medical Director.

The year 2021 began as a hopeful new beginning for Macon Volunteer Clinic. We continued cautious in-person patient care during these pandemic times. And although our numbers are still down, they are on an upward trend.







The Clinic underwent a strategic planning process during 2021. This created a blueprint to help guide the Clinic over the next several years. We created several ambitious goals that will continue to push this Clinic to greater heights.

During the year, we added E-food Talks to our services. This is a program through the University of Georgia to deliver nutrition education to patients. This online program has been a big benefit to our patients, especially our diabetic population.

We also hosted two separate events where patients could bring their pets to be spayed or neutered at no cost. Because our patients have barriers to their own care, so do their pets. This was a way to care for our patients and their beloved companions.

We partnered with the Department of Public Health to host two Covid-19 vaccination events at the Clinic. They were not limited to our patients, but open to the general public in an effort to increase local vaccination rates.
