ABOUT US

Macon Volunteer Clinic began when retired physician Chapin Henley gathered a group of diverse volunteers together in fall 2001. They shared a dream to open a free clinic that would provide a medical home for working, uninsured residents of Bibb County. Group leaders visited the Hilton Head Volunteers in Medicine Clinic and other facilities in the Southeast. The research trips confirmed their initial beliefs, that a volunteer clinic was a crucial component in closing some of the healthcare gaps facing the Bibb County community.

A generous grant from McNeil Laboratories and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation funded training from the Volunteers in Medicine Institute. Coliseum Health System donated a rentfree building on Rogers Avenue, and the Community Foundation of Central Georgia financed the site's renovation.
The MedCen Community Health
Foundation (now Navicent Health
Foundation) supported research,
promotion, and fundraising efforts to get
the clinic started. The Peyton Anderson
Foundation generously funded start-up
costs ensuring the clinic's first year of
success.

Local businesses and individuals joined the effort and donated numerous items and services to help make the Macon Volunteer Clinic a reality. Volunteers spoke to civic groups and churches, as well as corporations and foundations, further increasing support.

As a result of this community-wide effort, Macon Volunteer Clinic was incorporated in 2002, received its 501(c) (3) status the same year, and opened its doors February 2003. Since, Macon Volunteer Clinic has made great strides in providing exceptional service to the community, and in 2024 expanded services to all Central Georgia counties.

Georgia continues to have one of the highest uninsured rates in the country. Those without insurance often choose to go without healthcare in order to pay for everyday needs.

Macon Volunteer Clinic provides free primary medical, dental, and eye care to uninsured working adults in Middle Georgia, whose income is equal to or less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Level.

MEET PATIENT H

A patient at Macon Volunteer Clinic who wanted to share his story anonymously.

Patient H is a born performer-full of life, laughter, and talent. But when his health began to decline, everything changed. He suffered from limited use of one arm, chronic headaches, trouble breathing, and dental issues that made chewing difficult. The pain made it hard to work, and even harder to perform on stage. Without insurance, H hesitated to seek help.

He felt his circumstances were his fault and focused on caring for others instead of himself. But when the discomfort became too great to ignore, he turned to Macon Volunteer Clinic-and everything began to shift. At MVC, he found a team that treated him with dignity and respect. He no longer felt ashamed. With support from volunteer providers and staff like Dona, the dental coordinator, and Cherish, the office manager, he received the care he needed. The dental work he received, in particular, restored not just his

smile, but his confidence. As a performer, that meant everything.

"The clinic taught me it's okay to take care of myself," he said. "I can't even begin to tell you how much of a blessing it's been for my physical, emotional, financial, and mental health."

To those who support the clinic, he offers heartfelt thanks: "I ain't no crybaby, but I'm sincerely appreciative. It's one of the best decisions you could ever make. You're helping."

The Macon Volunteer Clinic proudly celebrates the accomplishments of 2024, all thanks to the dedication and support of our volunteers. With volunteer numbers at robust levels, we facilitated 8,283 patient encounters and welcomed 125 new patients into our care network! A new cohort of volunteers has joined our journey, representing specialties such as endocrinology, neurology, acupuncture, dentistry, physical therapy, optometry, and more.


Building for the Future

The Need Many of our patients fall into the "coverage gap." They earn too much to qualify for Medicaid and not enough to afford coverage with ACA (Obamacare) premiums. 28.68% of adults in the Middle Georgia counties we serve are uninsured. For these individuals, Macon Volunteer Clinic is often their only option for access to quality, compassionate healthcare.



Q: Isn't everyone covered by health insurance now under the Affordable Care Act?

No, not at all. Many people in Georgia and Macon-Bibb County remain uninsured even after the passage of the Affordable Care Act.

The uninsured include:

- Adults who make too much money to qualify for Medicaid but not enough to afford the federal insurance exchanges.
- Adults who are eligible for insurance on the federal exchange but who cannot afford the high co-pays and deductibles associated with even the most modest insurance plan available under the ACA.

Q: Where do MVC patients come from?

Macon Volunteer Clinic (MVC) patients are working, low-income adults who are not offered insurance by their employers and who cannot afford to purchase health insurance on their own. Many of our patients are service-industry employees who work at restaurants, dry cleaners, daycares, and hotels. They sit with elderly individuals, clean houses, and take care of children. They are the faces of the working uninsured in Middle Georgia. Without the services of MVC, patients report they would use the local emergency room or urgent care facilities.

Q: How does MVC impact the local community?

By providing quality healthcare to working, uninsured adults, Macon Volunteer Clinic contributes to the health and prosperity of our entire community. MVC provides primary medical, dental, and eye care, as well as medication assistance to adults with multiple and

complex medical problems who would otherwise end up in the emergency room due to lack of insurance. This reduces the amount of uncompensated care provided by local hospitals and helps MVC patients avoid additional health complications. The care provided at MVC helps lower the cost of healthcare for ALL residents of Middle Georgia. In fact, a University of Georgia study found that \$50,000 in emergency room costs is saved each year for every 100 patients treated by a charitable clinic in Georgia.

Q: Why is it so important to treat uninsured adults in Middle Georgia?

Healthcare costs and loss of productivity associated with lack of health insurance are staggering. The uninsured are much less likely to have primary care providers than the insured. They also receive less preventive care, dental care, chronic disease management, and behavioral health counseling. Those without insurance are often diagnosed at later, less treatable disease stages than those with insurance. Overall, people with no insurance have worse health outcomes, lower quality of life, and higher mortality rates. MVC patients benefit from a regular source of healthcare and medication assistance, as do the families who rely on their income and the employers who rely on their presence.

Q: Who provides MVC medical care?

MVC has over 150 volunteer physicians, nurses, dentists, dental hygienists, and other volunteers who generously donate their time to help care for patients in need. MVC medical care is overseen by an experienced board-certified physician who serves as Medical Director.







For Lakeshie Robinson, joining Macon Volunteer Clinic as a Marriage and Family Therapy (MFT) intern was more than a professional opportunity—it was personal.

"I first heard about the clinic through my mom," Lakeshie recalls. "She was a patient here and always spoke so highly of the care she received. Even without insurance, she felt truly seen and respected. That left a lasting impression on me."

Motivated by her mother's experience and her own passion for emotional wellness, Lakeshie reached out to the clinic in 2024 to begin her internship as part of a new partnership with Mercer University's MFT program. She was drawn to the clinic's reputation for compassionate, client-centered care and its unwavering commitment to underserved communities.

"Interning at Macon Volunteer Clinic has been transformative," she says. "It's deepened my understanding of the barriers so many people face in accessing basic healthcare. More than anything, it's shown me the power of compassion and community in overcoming those challenges."

As a future therapist with a calling to serve rural populations, Lakeshie has seen firsthand how a safe, supportive environment can begin the process of healing.

"My clients here have taught me so much about resilience and trust. Many face overwhelming challenges—medical issues, financial stress, emotional trauma—but they still show up, ready to do the work. They've reminded me that healing often starts with being heard and treated with dignity."

Her time at the clinic has also shaped her personally and professionally, reinforcing her desire to be both clinically skilled and deeply empathetic.

"This experience has strengthened my commitment to being a socially conscious therapist– someone who is present, patient, and truly connected to the people I serve. I want to help close the gap in mental health access, especially in rural areas where stigma and scarcity still exist."

Lakeshie Robinson's journey is a powerful reminder of how one person's story can come full circle-how a daughter inspired by her mother's care now plays a vital role in giving that same care to others.

MEET PATIENT C

A patient at Macon Volunteer Clinic who wanted to share her story anonymously.

Patient C is a Macon native who had driven by Macon Volunteer Clinic's Rogers Avenue location for years. She knew people who had received care there, so when she lost her health insurance, she decided to give the clinic a try-hoping she, too, could find support. Her initial needs were straightforward: managing hypertension and accessing affordable prescriptions. But over time, chronic mobility issues made her situation more complex. Although recently approved for disability, she now faces a

mandatory two-year waiting period for Medicare. In the meantime, Macon Volunteer Clinic is her only source of medical care. "Without the clinic's help, I don't know what I'd do," she says.

She's currently working with volunteer orthopedic surgeon Dr. Hudspeth in hopes of qualifying for a procedure that could relieve her pain and restore some of her independence. "There's hope again," she says. "A path forward."

But C's challenges haven't only been physical. After the loss of her mother-her greatest emotional support-she found herself overwhelmed with grief. Through counseling sessions

with Lakeshie Robinson, MVC's volunteer therapist, she found a safe, confidential space to express her feelings. "Talking to her helped me deal with the pain. It gave me peace." Reflecting on how different her life might be without the clinic, she says, "I'd be crazy. I'd be dead." The pain, isolation, and uncertainty would have been too much to bear alone. "When I walk through the doors, I feel safe," she says. "All my needs are met, and the care I get here is just as good, if not better, than if I had insurance." To those who support the clinic, Patient C is clear: "It's needed. I hope they stay around and keep up the good work-helping me and others like me."

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


